WSAB Development Day

In November last year, WSAB held a Development Day. It was great to see all of our partners come together to refresh our strategy for the next three years. The day consisted of formulating our mission statement, values and behaviours. Incorporating Progress with Unity, working together with our partners and communities to create fair opportunities for our residents. MAPPT Team/VARM Process

On the 1st of November 2022 the Adult Safeguarding Team launched the Multiagency Prevention Protection Team (MAPPT), incorporating the Vulnerable Adult Risk Management (VARM) process. The team is made up of 5 Social Workers who work as co-ordinators within the VARM model. The VARM process is a multi-agency, adult risk management process to support multi-agency working around vulnerable adults deemed to **have mental capacity**, but who are at risk of serious harm or death. Our criteria under this process is that the person MUST have capacity to make decisions and choices, does not meet the criteria for Section 42 safeguarding (The Care Act 2014), is at risk of serious harm or death and/or there is a significant risk to the health and safety of others in the community. 

Learning and Improvement Update

WSAB continue to work closely with agencies on several Brief Learning Reviews (BLR's). Self-neglect occurred within a majority of these cases and when analysing overall learning trends, self-neglect is one of the highest thematic areas within the WSAB Learning Outcomes Framework (LOF). Adult Social Care (ASC) data shows that self-neglect continues to be in the top two types of abuse organisationally, averaging approximately 126 safeguarding alerts per month.

Below is an extract from the LOF.



Following on from the recent trend within BLR's, WSAB and ASC conducted a dip sample of self-neglect cases. It was recognised that self-neglect is a partnership concern.

Brief learning points are below:

- Consideration of Self Neglect Panel at earlier stages
- Drift and Delay
- Duplication of Alerts
- Agency Attendance at meetings



Learning and Improvement Update Continued

Good practice was woven throughout the dip sample which included some of the following:

- Robust protection plan and actions from strategy meetings/Risk Management Meetings.
- Defensible decision making/robust rationales.
- Identifying previous repeated self-neglect alerts.
- Regular monthly Risk Management Reviews with adult at risk and advocate.
- Good cross boarder communication and information sharing.

As a result of the findings a multi-agency Self-Neglect subgroup has been established. The subgroup will drive recommendations from the dip sample findings along with self-neglect actions within the WSAB Learning Outcomes Framework (LOF).
